Until and unless there is a more open, transparent & accountable system then there can NOT be any reform.

The way in which in HKSAR the medical profession controls the public funds for what they consider is "competent & accountable" health care (reflected by the mission statement of Hospital Association "competent & accountable" - when in fact it is neither!) shows that there is no open debate on reform.

Primary health care in HKSAR is often traditional medicines which people are paying out of pocket for - and this should be included within the "health care system".

In HKSAR the public has no chance of realizing "universal sufrage" and therefore they will ask for, and will receive, unrealistic benefits to pacify their unrealized rights. Everyone loses.
