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Subject Medical Fund Consultation



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As a retired Government servant for nearly 10 years, I would take this opportunity to clarify the following:

Whether I am still eligible for free medical services which I have been enjoying so far? What measures are to be introduced in the new era where I can still enjoy an efficient and effective medical services which are being eroded with shortage of skilful and experienced staff and supporting equipments? Why? I have never been able to make an telephone appointments in any family clinics and if the telephone is through, the answer is 'Sorry, all bookings are full for the day, the week and the month' When the Government keeps on employing high-ranking officials for its 'justified needs',the Colonial days high-ranking officials receiving 20,000-30,000 dollars per months have been reduced to nothing! What measures will be introduced to accord them with similar status when these days, a young guy, on appointment, normally receives a salary of 50,000-60,000 dollars per months! (an exaggeration?)
